Oʻahu is home to over 70 percent of Hawaiʻi's population and more than half of the statewide room inventory. Honolulu is the capital city and the business center of the state. A combination of world-class shopping, spectacular restaurants, vibrant nightlife and entertainment, and endless activities provides an energizing experience.

Its countryside provides a charming contrast to the contemporary city life of Honolulu and Waikīkī, and can be found just a little more than an hour away on the Leeward Coast (West Coast) and North Shore where must-see sights include Dole Plantation, Waimea Valley, Hale'iwa Town, the Polynesian Cultural Center and the famous wave breaks at Sunset Beach and 'Ehukai Beach (Banzai Pipeline).
