

Gate Park will celebrate its 150th anniversary in 2020 with a nearly year-long series of celebrations. Home to museums, monuments and protected wildlife, and host to some of San Francisco's most treasured annual events, the 1,000-plus acre Golden Gate Park stretches from the legendary Haight-Ashbury neighborhood to the Pacific Ocean.



2020 marks the 50th anniversary of San Francisco Pride. Long considered to be

the epicenter of LGBTQ culture and the modern fight for equality, San Francisco will be pulling out all the stops for this year's celebrations. Expect plenty of revelry during Pride Month in June, as well as during LGBT History Month in October.



San Francisco's Lake Merced will host the 2020 PGA Championship, May 11-17. This will be the first time a PGA Championship will be held in San Francisco, and only the second time a municipal course will host the competition. Tickets are expected to sell quickly.

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San Francisco is one of the most beautiful cities in the world. With waterside views, unique architecture, exquisite cuisine and diverse culture, it's naturally photogenic. Here are just a few spots for taking FOMO-inducing photos on your next trip to the City by the Bay.

1. Golden Gate Bridge

No trip to San Francisco is complete without a visit to the Golden Gate Bridge; but to capture a great angle of it, consider other vantage points. Crissy Field, a former military airfield south of the bridge, offers gorgeous views, as well as spots for picnicking. Or, head to Fort Point to snap a photo that will really make jaws drop.

2. The Presidio

For another stunning view of the Golden Gate Bridge, head to the Presidio to get a wide shot of the full span. While you're there, explore Andy Goldsworthy's immersive outdoor art gallery, and keep an eye out for colorful birds like Allen hummingbirds and belted kingfishers.

3. The Museum of Ice Cream

5. Alcatraz Ferry

For an unspoiled view of Alcatraz, the site of the first lighthouse in the western United States and infamous former penitentiary, head to Pier 33 for a short, scenic voyage on Alcatraz Cruises.



6. Golden Gate Park

From the Japanese Tea Garden to the Conservatory of Flowers, this world-famous park (celebrating its 150th birthday in 2020) is a treasure trove of photo ops. Check out the de Young Museum while you're there to see an array of contemporary and modern art and soak up the 360-degree views from the observation deck.




7. Mission Dolores Park

Snap a shot of palm trees, sloping hills, and the San Francisco skyline—not to mention some eye-catching locals—at the top of this park. On your way there, stroll through the Mission District to observe hundreds of vibrant murals.

8. PIER 39

Packed with sea lions and free performances of all sorts, there's so much to capture on camera at this destination.





9. Palace of Fine Arts

With Greek-style columns, this architectural masterpiece is definitely one of the most recognizable and resplendent landmarks in the city.

10. Chinatown

The oldest and largest Chinatown in the United States, this historic neighborhood has no shortage of photogenic storefronts and temples—not to mention lots of tasty food to sample while you walk around.





NEIGHBORHOOD STROLLS

Dynamic neighborhoods, diverse streetscapes and mild year-round temperatures make San Francisco a pedestrian-friendly playground. Before you tackle the city's famous hills, acquaint yourself with a few appealing corners of its scenic, walkable communities.







de Young Museum

The Richmond/Golden Gate Park

San Francisco celebrates the 150th birthday of Golden Gate Park in 2020, making this an ideal time to explore the gardens, groves and grassy hills stretched across the park's 1,017 acres. Several noteworthy attractions are also located here, including the Conservatory of Flowers, Japanese Tea Garden, National AIDS Memorial Grove and two standout facilities focused on art and nature.

- Start your adventure in the ninth-floor observation tower of the de Young
 Museum, where 360-degree city and ocean views provide a stunning sense of place.
 Downstairs, this engaging institution showcases paintings, sculptures and textiles by American and international artists.
- Across a tree- and fountain-filled oval called the Music Concourse, the
 California Academy of Arts and Sciences tucks an aquarium, planetarium and
 natural history museum under one wildflower-topped living roof. Save time for
 the four-story rainforest dome that's occupied by 250 butterflies and birds.
- Pick up picnic supplies at Arguello Market, a block beyond the park's northern border, or continue up Arguello St. to Clement St. Here, neighborhood dining

options range from spicy noodles and curries at **Burma Superstar** to elaborate cakes, tarts and cookies at **Schubert's Bakery**. The cozy confectionery has been making San Francisco sweeter since 1911.

• Browse the Richmond's independent shops and boutiques. **Green Apple Books**, a beloved source of new and used literature, non-fiction, children's stories, travel guides, magazines and more spills across two Clement St. storefronts. **Foggy Notion** features jewelry, home goods and gifts, with a focus on handmade and eco-friendly items.







Fifty years after San Francisco's first Pride celebration, San Francisco's Castro district sustains strong spiritual and historical connections to the LGBTQ rights movement. Cultural sites, bars and shops celebrate LGBTQ culture in this dynamic neighborhood that welcomes visitors of all stripes.

- From Castro and Market streets, where rainbow flags fly above Harvey Milk Plaza, follow the Rainbow Honor Walk's bronze sidewalk plaques commemorating LGBTQ pioneers, including astronaut Sally Ride and poet Allen Ginsberg.
- After pausing at Milk's former home and camera shop near Castro and 18th streets, step into the GLBT Historical Society Museum to view multimedia exhibitions that explore diversity and social justice.
- Detour down 18th St. to fuel up on almond croissants and coffee at Les Marais Bakery, a family-owned café with French roots and three San Francisco locations.
- Check the marquee for movie times at the Castro Theatre, which plays current films and sing-along screenings of classic flicks—complete with live Wurlitzer organ music. A few doors away, Cliff's Variety carries hardware, toys, craft supplies and California souvenirs in every color of the rainbow.
- Complete your Castro experience with a pint at Hi Tops, a gay sports bar with pub bites. Or, you can dance the night away at The Café, which is right down the block and newly renovated.



Dogpatch/Mission Bay

Anchored by the new Chase Center, home to the Golden State Warriors, Mission Bay and the neighboring Dogpatch neighborhood appeal to sports fans, cultural travelers and culinary connoisseurs alike.

- Mini-golf greens inspired by San Francisco's past and present border the food trucks and fire pits of **Spark Social SF**, an outdoor dining destination and beer garden just blocks from Chase Center.
- Follow the San Francisco Bay Trail south from Chase Center to **The Ramp**, a salty seafood and burger joint with a waterfront patio and live music on weekends. For a more serene stop, pint-sized Glena's serves summery cocktails and tacos topped with tofu, grilled rock cod or pork shoulder, pineapple and salsa verde.
- Fresh off its 15th anniversary, the nearby **Museum of Craft and Design** spotlights contemporary artists, architects, designers and makers through innovative exhibitions that examine the intersection of craft, design and culture.
- Up the block at **Daily Driver**, staffers practice the craft of bagel-making. Locals top their favorite hand-rolled, wood-fired selections with cream cheese and cultured butter churned in the on-site creamery.
- House-crafted ales are the draw at neighboring Magnolia Dogpatch. Across the street at Third Rail, try any one of their outrageous whiskey cocktails paired with some of their signature jerky.

With world-class aquariums, interactive exhibits, nightlife events and some of the country's most diverse art collections, San Francisco's museums rank among its top attractions. Whether you're interested in art, science, history or pop culture, there's something for everyone. If seeing the magnificent collections isn't enough, their critically acclaimed architecture offers some of the best photo ops in the city. Be sure to include a stop at one (or more) of these museums during your stay.



ASIAN ART MUSEUM

200 Larkin St.

Located in the Civic Center neighborhood opposite City Hall, this stately museum has one of the world's most diverse collections of art and objects from across the Asian continent. spanning 6,000 years of human history. Visitors can enjoy beautiful paintings, sculptures, furniture, textiles and armor, among other objects. A recent expansion, creating an additional 13,000 square feet of exhibition space, is scheduled for completion in Spring 2020.

CALIFORNIA ACADEMY OF SCIENCES

55 Music Concourse Dr.

Home to an aquarium, planetarium and natural history museum "all under one living roof," the California Academy of Sciences is an institution like no other. From the splashing penguins to the

four-story living rainforest and colorful coral reef ecosystem, there's something to delight visitors of all ages.

CALIFORNIA HISTORICAL SOCIETY

678 Mission St.

The California Historical Society has been preserving the rich history of California for more than 140 years. Explore engaging and informative exhibits at their location in the bustling SoMa neighborhood. The bookstore is an ideal spot to find California-centric books and gifts.

CARTOON ART MUSEUM

781 Beach St.

Founded in 1984, the Cartoon Art Museum houses everything from comic strips, comic books and anime to political cartoons, graphic novels and underground comix. People of all ages can participate in animation workshops and mingle with professional cartoonists. The museum is located in Fisherman's Wharf just one block from Ghirardelli Square.

CHILDREN'S CREATIVITY MUSEUM

221 Fourth St.

Even if you're not traveling with kids, the Children's Creativity Museum is a fun way to spend the day. Filled with interactive exhibits that focus on animation, music and digital media, the museum is located opposite a historic carousel in Yerba Buena Gardens. Be sure to take a ride!

CONTEMPORARY JEWISH MUSEUM

736 Mission St.

The Contemporary
Jewish Museum presents
dynamic exhibitions and

DE YOUNG MUSEUM

50 Hagiwara Tea Garden Dr.

Nestled in Golden Gate Park, the de Young houses more than 27,000 works and includes an extensive collection of American art from the 17th through 21st centuries. There's much to see, from textiles and costumes to rare paintings. Don't miss the wraparound views of San Francisco from atop the Hamon Observation Tower.

EXPLORATORIUM

Pier 15, The Embarcadero

The Exploratorium is an interactive museum for all ages and boasts more than 650 hands-on exhibits. Experiment with thoughts, feelings and social behavior in the Human Phenomena Gallery, Experience different types of rainstorms in the outdoor North Gallery, and investigate the history, geography and ecology of the bay in the Fisher Bay Observation Gallery. There's even more to explore at the adults-only program, "After Dark."

LEGION OF HONOR

100 34th Ave.

Built to commemorate Californian soldiers who died in World War I, the Legion of Honor is a neoclassical landmark overlooking Lincoln Park and the Golden Gate Bridge. The museum's collection covers more than 4,000 years of ancient and European art, as well as the Achenbach Foundation for Graphic Arts. Don't miss a performance on the Skinner pipe organ on weekends at 4 p.m.

MUSEUM OF THE AFRICAN DIASPORA (MOAD)

685 Mission St.

The Smithsonian-affiliated MoAD seeks to share the art and stories of African heritage with audiences from around the world, and is one of the few museums in the country dedicated to the African diaspora, the migration of African people, and their lasting cultural and historical impact.

MUSEUM OF CRAFT AND DESIGN

2569 Third St.

One of North America's few institutions dedicated to contemporary craft and design, the museum's mission is to explore the active roles these practices play in everyday life through original and traveling exhibitions, collaborations with institutions from

around the world, and hands-on opportunities to learn how to make your own crafts.

SAN FRANCISCO MUSEUM OF MODERN ART (SFMOMA)

151 Third St.

This gem in SoMa has seven floors, 45,000 square feet of free exhibits, and a grand façade inspired by the waters and fog of the San Francisco Bau. The museum's permanent collection includes more than 33,000 pieces. Newer additions include the Fisher Collection, which includes works bu Andy Warhol, Alexander Calder and many others, and the Pritzker Center for Photography, the largest space permanently dedicated to photography at anu art museum in the U.S.



THE WALT DISNEY FAMILY MUSEUM

104 Montgomery St., Presidio

This museum is dedicated to the life and work of Walt Disney, creator of some of America's most beloved animation, including Mickey Mouse. Housed in a historic building in the Presidio, it features contemporary interactive galleries and state-of-theart exhibits showcasing early drawings, cartoons, movies and a spectacular model of Disneyland. While you're there, enjoy daily screenings of Disney classics.

YERBA BUENA CENTER FOR THE ARTS

701 Mission St.

Located in the heart of Yerba Buena Gardens, Yerba Buena Center for the Arts presents cutting edge, contemporary visual art, performances, film/video and community engagement programs by some of the most innovative artists working today. YBCA is distinguished by its support for artists from around the world.

San Francisco is well-known as a welcoming place for artists. For artist Ana Teresa Fernandez, a graduate of the San Francisco Art Institute, it's become a second home. Her work explores politics, activism and intersectionality through performance, video, paintings and installations, and she's been featured both locally and around the world. Ana Teresa also frequently partners with nonprofits and art organizations to help improve communities. Read on for her recommendations for experiencing San Francisco.

FAVORITE NEIGHBORHOOD FOR OBSERVING PUBLIC ART:

Being an artist in San Francisco, I'm constantly finding hidden gems of public art, small and large. The Mission is a nest for many murals and hand-painted signs, especially folkloric ones, with made-up words like "Washateria" (laundromat). The Women's Building has a façade depicting colorful revolutionary women. I really enjoy the unexpected public expressions in every neighborhood. There was a graffiti piece located under a freeway in the Bayshore that featured the word "dream" repeated over and over. I learned much later that it was an homage to the street artist Dream, who fought to keep peace among gangs and used art as a way of teaching youngsters. This inspired me to create a 70'x 15' "DREAM" sculpture, to echo louder an invitation to the city to dream.

GO-TO SPOT FOR INSPIRATION:

Recently, I have been working on a collaboration with the non-profit Creativity Explored, a space where artists with developmental disabilities create and share their work with the community. Working with these artists has been such an inspiration. Not only do they show up every day with joy and kindness, they work with an unfiltered and raw approach to simply create. There is a courage and fearlessness to just be themselves that is so contagious, and it's something I have tried to harness in my own studio and working relationships.

FAVORITE VIEW IN SAN FRANCISCO:

I am incredibly lucky that my favorite view is from my apartment on the Great Highway, staring out at the Pacific Ocean. I love watching the constant change of the waves, swell, light, colors and weather. It is a great reminder of how magical and ever-changing nature is, and how urgent it is that we protect it. I also get to experience the colorful and surreal sunsets every evening that Karl (the fog, such a constant visitor that he has a name in San Francisco) will allow.

FAVORITE OUTDOOR ACTIVITY:

Surfing. This has truly changed my relationship with San Francisco. It has become my psychological rinse and shower. Just being in the ocean provides a different perspective on the city and a way to clear my head. I try to surf every day, even if it's freezing and the waves are wild. I tell people that art helped me find meaning in my life, but surfing has kept me from drowning in the art world.

FAVORITE PLACE TO SEE A LIVE PERFORMANCE:

Yerba Buena Center for the Arts (YBCA). I have been following LINES Ballet at YBCA for almost 15 years. LINES is a hybrid of dancing that has pushed my own understanding of the body's ability to incorporate movements inspired by animals, currents in nature and art forms from all over the world. Alonzo King, the choreographer, collaborates with other artists and groups to create the performances. I first saw the Shaolin Monks perform in 2004 and I've been every season since!

ESCAPE FROM THE ROCK



San Francisco at night is just as vibrant as during the day—maybe even more so. The nightlife scene is an impressive mix of innovation, friendliness and inclusivity. If you're looking to explore the city after hours, head to one (or all) of these neighborhoods.





Union Square

Head to Union Square for skillfully mixed cocktails and hard-to-find small batch spirits. **Swig** is a fun two-story bar where you'll find contemporary twists on classic drinks. Travel back to the 1920s at **Bourbon & Branch**, a speakeasy that riffs on the Prohibition era when alcohol was outlawed.

At the iconic Lizzie's
Starlight, located on the
21st floor of the Sir Francis
Drake Hotel, you can take in
the bird's-eye view or settle
into a plush booth for some
good old-fashioned peoplewatching. Running with a
crowd? Order a tasty spiked
punch bowl for sharing.





WHERE TO GO DANCING

SoMa

Dense with dance clubs, SoMa is one of the hottest spots for an unforgettable evening. Get your fill of electronic and house music at Halcyon SF, an early 1900s brick warehouse with plenty of room to dance the night away. VERSO is a more intimate space where DJs spin into the wee hours, playing trance, hip-hop, throwbacks, EDM or Top 40 depending on the night. Head to The Grand for lavish VIP table service and two stories of dance floors.





WHERE TO GRAB A GLASS OF WINE

Embarcadero/ Financial District

If you prefer to sit back and relax, this neighborhood has some great spots to savor a glass of wine.

The Barrel Room offers more than 50 wines by the glass and flight, with a lounge open late. The wines at The Hidden Vine span the globe and fill an extensive menu. If you're in the mood for bubbles, visit The Barbarossa Lounge

and choose something sparkly from the generous champagne menu. Serious wine drinkers should head to **Press Club**, a retro-modern wine bar that offers rare magnums by the glass.





WHERE TO HAVE DINNER BEFORE GOING OUT

Mission District

The Mission District is a veritable foodie's paradise, where all kinds of cuisines are perfected with a welcoming, unfussy vibe. Dine at the Michelin starwinning Commonwealth for modern American fare and an eclectic wine list. Central

FOOD & DRINK EXPERIENCES

You may leave your heart in San Francisco, but you most certainly won't leave with an empty stomach. From famous firsts like martinis and sourdough bread to iconic eats like Mission burritos and Dungeness crab, San Francisco is what foodie dreams are made of. Whether you're on a Michelin-star splurge or a food truck treasure hunt, you'll want to check these items off your culinary bucket list.

FEAST ON SEAFOOD AT FISHERMAN'S WHARF.

Fisherman's Wharf is one of the most famous places in the world for fresh-off-the-boat seafood. There are a few specialties you shouldn't miss. Italian-American dockworkers are credited with inventing cioppino, a tomato-based stew consisting of fish, shrimp, clams and whatever else is left over from the day's catch. Try it at Cioppino's or Alioto's, which first began selling the stew on the docks back in 1925. San Francisco is also known for Dungeness crab and oysters, thanks to the chilly Pacific waters just off the coast. Take a crack at 'em at Fog Harbor Fish House or Franciscan Crab Restaurant, two quintessential Fisherman's Wharf restaurants with sparkling bay views.

SCORE SOME LEGENDARY SOURDOUGH BREAD.

Perfect for soaking up cioppino or holding steaming chowder, sourdough bread is one of San Francisco's most iconic food creations. Taste the Original San Francisco Sourdough at Boudin Bakery & Cafe, which has been churning out piping-hot loaves since 1849, making it the longest continually operating business in the city. Other can't-miss bakeries include

Acme Bread and the James Beard Award-winning Tartine.

Mission burritos are one of San Francisco's most popular exports, and you can thank the residents of the Mission District for their handiwork. These so-big-you-can-bench-press-them flavor bombs are stuffed full and served with extras like rice, sour cream, salsa and guac. Taqueria La Cumbre claims to be the birthplace, but you can't go wrong at El Farolito, La Taqueria or dozens of other Mission kitchens, either.

WARM UP WITH AN IRISH COFFEE.

It may have originated in the Emerald Isle, but Irish Coffee was perfected and popularized in San Francisco back in the 1950s. Inspired by a boozy pick-me-up served in Ireland's Shannon Airport, Buena Vista Café co-owner Jack Koeppler and Pulitzer Prize-winning travel writer Stanton Delaplane teamed up to create the perfect blend of hot coffee, Irish whiskey and whipped cream that is now so famous, the café serves up to 2,000 of them every day!



Among the many cultural gifts brought to San Francisco by Chinese immigrants is dim sum, an assortment of bite-sized pastries and dumplings served on carts and traditionally eaten for breakfast. Chinatown is ground zero for dim sum any time of day, with a bevy of sit-down and takeout spots lining the streets. More delectable dim sum can be found around the city, from Yank Sing in the Financial District to Hong Kong Lounge in the Richmond.

TASTE AMERICA'S FIRST CRAFT BEER.

Fun fact: America's OG craft beer, Anchor Steam, was first brewed here way back in the mid-1800s, fermented on rooftops and cooled by foggy night air. Taste it and other Anchor Brewing classics on a behind-the-scenes tour at Anchor Public Taps. Not a beer drinker? Opt for Anchor Brewing's distilling arm, Hotaling & Co., to sip Junipero Gin, Nikka Whiskey and other award-winning spirits.

TREAT YOURSELF TO INCREDIBLE ICE CREAM.

Thanks in part to the Museum of Ice Cream (and its much-Instagrammed sprinkle pool), San Francisco has become a hotspot for the cool treat.

Other places to get your sweet fix include the world-famous
Ghirardelli Ice Cream & Chocolate



Shop, where you can indulge in a sundae topped with fresh-from-the-factory hot fudge, and local-favorites like Bi-Rite, Mitchell's and Humphry Slocombe, known for its deliciously offbeat flavors like "Secret Breakfast," made with bourbon and corn flakes.

SIP A MARTINI IN NORTH BEACH.

Yet another San Francisco creation that took the world by storm, the martini was reportedly first stirred (or was it shaken?) at the Occidental Hotel by the "father of American mixology," Jerry Thomas, sometime in the late 1800s. Sadly, the 1906 earthquake and subsequent fire destroyed the hotel, but the cocktail has lived on. Enjoy some of the finest martinis in town along with a classic Italian meal at North Beach institutions like Tony's Pizza Napoletana and Original Joe's.



TRY SOME OF EVERYTHING AT LOCAL FOOD HALLS.

If you just want to taste it all, follow your stomach to San Francisco's food halls, which pack loads of eclectic eats into one easy stop. Start your culinary adventure right off the plane at SFO's Manufactory Food Hall, home to outposts of venerated restaurants like Tartine and Kin Khao. Sample everything from dumplings to Peking duck at China Live, a sprawling food paradise in Chinatown. And the iconic Ferry Building Marketplace is home to nearly 50 food merchants, plus the city's most famous farmers market.



OF STATE BIRD PROVISIONS

NICOLE KRASINSKI

Chef proprietors and Bay Area natives Stuart Brioza and Nicole Krasinski combined the hardiness and adaptability of California's state bird, the California quail, and the act of providing delicious food and drink to create their Fillmore District restaurant, State Bird Provisions (1529 Fillmore St.) and its family-style sister restaurant, The Progress (1525 Fillmore St.). Like San Francisco itself, their cuisine is eclectic and constantly evolving in nature. Here, Stuart and Nicole share five recommendations for savoring your time in the city.

FAVORITE ONLY-IN-SAN FRANCISCO DELICACY:

From April through October, we have an abundant local anchovy season. There's one fisherman who catches anchovies in the bay and then sells them right at Pier 43. These tasty little fish come directly to restaurants from the water and are served on menus all over the city, including both State Bird Provisions and The Progress.

FAVORITE LOCAL SPOT FOR A GREAT COCKTAIL:

Although it's not a bar, we love the simple margaritas and extensive Mezcal list at Nopalito (306 Broderick St. and 1224 Ninth Ave.). They also make a great Michelada (a spicy mix of beer, tomato juice, lime and jalapeño), which is the perfect mid-day drink on a day off, especially after a bike ride through Golden Gate Park.

FAVORITE ANNUAL EVENT IN SAN FRANCISCO:

La Cocina Street Food Festival remains one of the best places to sample and support the diverse culinary talents the Bay Area has to offer. They celebrated their 10th anniversary in 2019, and each year they amp it up and add new ways to experience the event. (Editor's note: La Cocina's festival occurs in early October in the Dogpatch neighborhood. Learn more at lacocinasf.org.)

WHERE YOU'D HAVE YOUR LAST MEAL IN SAN FRANCISCO:

Michelle Polzine's 20th Century Café (198 Gough St.) is a gem in the city. We dream about her pierogi, strudel and perfect fruit galettes. Her everything bagels with smoked salmon are our favorite to-go snack for airplane travel, or frankly, any road trip in the car.

WHAT EVERY VISITOR SHOULD DO AT LEAST ONCE:

Visit Lands End. The sweeping views of the bay and the Golden Gate Bridge are not to be missed and the rocky beach hike feels like a quintessential San Francisco pilgrimage. We do it at least once a month and then grab cinnamon toast and espresso at Trouble Coffee (4033 Judah St.) post-hike.

This Mission District fave has won a gamut of awards, including a spot on the World's 50 Best Bars list. The uber-creative, ever-changing drink menu-with themes ranging from Chinese takeout to tattoo art—snagged the World's Best Cocktail Menu prize at the 2017 Spirited Awards.

REDWOOD ROOM

495 Geary St.

Between the "liquid art" cocktails and sumptuous, Phillip Starcke-designed interiors, this stylish spot will sweep you off your feet. In fact, it's been deemed one of the 10 Best Hotel Bars in the U.S. by USA Today.

PACIFIC COCKTAIL HAVEN

580 Sutter St.

In a sea of great bars, Pacific Cocktail Haven is an island unto itself. Barmaster Kevin Diedrich's creations feature quirky ingredients like miso and roasted corn togarashi. That ingenuity landed PCH on Esquire's 27 Best Bars in America 2019.

THE INTERVAL

2 Marina Blvd.

The Interval may be best described as a thinking person's bar—a curious mashup of museum, salon and watering hole, where ideas flow as freely as the libations. Named to Thrillist's Best Cocktail Bars in America, this Fort Mason mainstay serves heady drinks to savor over a book from the in-house library.

SMUGGLER'S COVE

650 Gough St.

This iconic tiki bar has racked up more awards than a top-brass admiral. The latest honor: inclusion on Liquor.com's 13 Most Influential Bars of the 21st Century. Believe the hype as you sidle up to the pirate-themed bar to share a blazing Top Notch Volcano with your mateus.

Medal-Worthy Breweries

BARREL HEAD BREWHOUSE

1785 Fulton St.

This brewery recently won big at the World Beer Cup, nabbing a bronze for its Brother Harker Patersbier. But this NoPa hangout is equally loved by San Franciscans for its creative brunch, beer cocktails and big selection of microbrews, which flow from a WWII-era torpedo.

21ST AMENDMENT

MAGNOLIA BREWING

1398 Haight St.; 2505 Third St.

These San Francisco beer pioneers with hippie homebrewer roots have won too many awards to count in their two-decade run. With locations in Haight-Ashbury and Dogpatch, you'll have plenty of chances to sip Magnolia's flagship Kalifornia Kolsch and Proving Ground IPA.

BARTLETT HALL

242 O'Farrell St.

Fresh off two big wins at the California State Fair brewing competition-first place in chocolate beer, second place in honey beer-Bartlett Hall has cemented its spot in San Francisco's beer hall of fame. Even if beer's not your thing, the top-notch food and barrelaaed cocktails are delicious.

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

BAYVIEW


Home to the oldest opera house in San Francisco, this area also boasts a vibrant artists' colony at the old Hunters Point shipyard and scenic nature trails.

CASTRO/ NOE VALLEY

Find outdoor cafés, unique history and bustling bars in the Castro, known as the "LGBTQ capital of the world." Neighboring Noe Valley is a charming, Victorian neighborhood.

CENTRAL MARKET

A bustling combination of tech businesses, arts groups, retail and restaurants, Central Market is also home to a concentration of performance venues like the Orpheum and Golden Gate theaters.



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CHINATOWN

This storied neighborhood is North America's first and oldest Chinatown, featuring colorful pagoda roofs, dragon lampposts, acclaimed dining and unique gift shops.

CIVIC CENTER/ HAYES VALLEY

This cultural hub includes stately City Hall, the War Memorial Opera House and the Asian Art Museum, alongside more modern additions like the SFJAZZ Center and New Conservatory Theatre Center.

EMBARCADERO/ FINANCIAL DISTRICT

This historic seaport boasts views of soaring skyscrapers; the Ferry Building, a public space housing a food hall and farmers market; and the Exploratorium, a hands-on learning laboratory.

FILLMORE

One of the primary incubators for the city's music scene, Fillmore continues to be a place for legendary performances.

FISHERMAN'S WHARF

One of the city's most popular attractions. Here you can "escape" to Alcatraz or set sail on the San Francisco Bay with chartered boat tours. Don't miss the attractions at PIER 39, including Boudin, the city's sourdough purveyor for 150 years.

HAIGHT-ASHBURY

The Summer of Love is immortalized in Haight-Ashbury's vintage clothing, book and record stores. Nearby Alamo Square's row of Victorian homes is one of the most photographed spots in San Francisco.

JAPANTOWN

The oldest of only three Japantowns left in the country, this neighborhood is packed with culinary delights, including ramen bars, shabu shabu, izikayas and Benkyodo, which has supplied the city with handmade rice confections since 1906.

MARINA/ PACIFIC HEIGHTS

From the posh plateau of Pacific Heights to the bayside Marina Green, these neighborhoods offer views, scenery and a restored "palace" from 1915.

MISSION DISTRICT

San Francisco's oldest neighborhood and the center of its Latino culture has hip restaurants, music venues, boutiques and the city's largest concentration of murals.

NOB HILL

Known not only as a geographic high point but an economic one, too, with a history of wealthy residents, Nob Hill is now home to luxury hotels, beautiful gardens and impressive homes.

NORTH BEACH

Rich in Italian heritage, North Beach has restaurants, quaint cafés, cabarets, jazz clubs, galleries, boutiques and gelato parlors.

RICHMOND/PRESIDIO

The southern anchor of the Golden Gate Bridge, the Presidio offers pristine nature, cultural attractions and terrific dining. In the Richmond, visit the historic Cliff House for unbeatable views.

SOMA/YERBA BUENA

This neighborhood has one of the densest concentrations of museums, nightclubs and Oracle Park, home of the San Francisco Giants.

SUNSET/ GOLDEN GATE PARK

Within Golden Gate Park, you'll find some of the city's most famous attractions, including the California Academy of Sciences and the de Young Museum. True to its name, the Sunset neighborhood is a great place to watch the sun set over the Pacific Ocean.

TREASURE ISLAND

Views of downtown San Francisco, urban wineries and weekend flea markets are the draw to this mid-point for the luminous Bay Bridge.

UNION SQUARE

Union Square is the center of San Francisco's shopping scene, with art galleries, small boutiques, designer shops and name-brand stores. You're in the heart of the Theater District, too, with A.C.T.'s Geary Theater and the Curran, among others.

WHAT TO SEE & DO

Bayview is the sunniest neighborhood in San Francisco, home to nesting ospreys, a burgeoning creative scene and diverse sights and bites. It's also one of the oldest business districts in California and has a significant legacy of African-American religious, civic, cultural, athletic, educational and technological achievements.

- Walk along **Heron's Head Trail** or **Candlestick Point Park** to spot ospreys, herons and other shorebirds.
- Experience a glassblowing workshop at **Public Glass** or shop for art and craft supplies at **SCRAP**, a non-profit creative reuse center, materials depot and workshop space founded in 1976.
- In fall and spring, attend an open studio event at **The Point**, home to one of the largest concentrations of working artists in the U.S. Be sure to visit the restored, historic **Bayview Opera House**, built in 1888.
- Enjoy soul food spots like **Old Skool Café** or oysters on the half-shell at **The Old Clam House**. **Radio Africa & Kitchen** blends Mediterranean, Californian and African cuisines.
- For brews, head to **Speakeasy Ales & Lagers**, a stylish microbrewery offering tours and other special events.






WHAT TO SEE & DO

Regardless of your sexual orientation, no trip to San Francisco would be complete without a visit to the Castro, the country's most famous LGBTQ neighborhood. Nearby Noe Valley, a village of wooden Victorian houses, has a touch of the Castro's flair and an easygoing mix of hipsters and families.

- Start your tour on the Castro's eponymous main drag and visit the **Castro Theatre**, an ornate movie palace with a Mighty Wurlitzer-playing organist who performs before every show. On your way out, take note of the golden plaques that make up the **Rainbow Honor Walk**, paying tribute to LGBTQ pioneers.
- For more history, consider a tour with **Wild SF Walking Tours** or a visit to the **GLBT History Museum**, the first full-scale, stand-alone museum of its kind in the U.S.
- Don't miss **Cliff's Variety**, a local institution where you'll find just about anything, including housewares, home furnishings, toys and costumes.
- The upper stretch of Market St. coils around the lower reaches of **Twin Peaks**. Noted for their sweeping vistas, these crests are popular with hikers, cyclists and photographers in search of the perfect shot.
- The liveliest times of year are during Pride in June and the Castro Street Fair in October. Noe Valley features a Wine Walk in August, seasonal hayrides and "24 HoliDAYS on 24th Street" in December.







CENTRAL MARKET



WHAT TO SEE & DO

A combination of high tech (offices for Twitter, Spotify and Square are here), arts groups, retail and restaurants, Central Market is booming. Also known as Mid-Market, this area comprises a roughly seven-block section of Market St.

- Major Broadway productions are featured on the stages of the **Golden Gate** and **Orpheum** theaters. Directly across from UN Plaza is the American Conservatory Theater's dynamic and intimate **Strand Theater**.
- Just a block away, the **International Art Museum of America** houses an eclectic collection of both classic and modern art. The **Warfield** hosts a number of Live Nation concerts and performances.
- At the intersection of Eighth and Market streets, look for the 92-foot "Venus," San Francisco's tallest statue.
- On the north edge, the Tenderloin is home to Glide Memorial Church, experimental theater companies, and jazz and blues clubs. Visit the Tenderloin Museum to learn about the area's many historical events and movements.
- Tuck into the **Pineapple Bistro and Bar** at The Alise hotel for a quick bite and pre-show drink.

CHINATOWN



WHAT TO SEE & DO

San Francisco's Chinatown, North America's first and largest, is located next to North Beach and adjacent to the Financial District. With its pagoda-style architecture, ornate lamp posts, exotic menus and other distinctive elements, a stop here can feel more like a trip abroad than a neighborhood stroll.

- Stroll past markets heaped with vegetables, ducks, herbs and other goods to get a taste of China without leaving California.
- Learn about the community's history at the **Chinese Historical Society of America Museum** on Clay St. Near
 Portsmouth Square, visit the **Chinese Culture Center**, which is
 free. See the latest exhibition in their Visual Art Center or sign
 up for one of their neighborhood walking tours.
- Enjoy a mix of local history and flavors with Wok Wiz Tours or get an insider view of daily life and historic landmarks from All About Chinatown Tours.
- Authentic restaurants are everywhere in the neighborhood, but few compare to **China Live**, a multi-story Chinese food emporium that offers a variety of dining experiences.
- Did you know the fortune cookie was first created in San Francisco? See how they get made at the Golden Gate Fortune Cookie Factory at 56 Ross Alley.




CIVIC CENTER/ HAYES VALLEY



WHAT TO SEE & DO

One of the city's central hubs for culture, Civic Center and Hayes Valley are home to stately concert halls, renowned museums and expansive public plazas.

- The grandeur of early 20th century Beaux-Arts architecture is showcased in gorgeous **City Hall** on Van Ness Ave.
- Directly across the street rises the ornate War Memorial Opera House, home of the San Francisco Opera and the San Francisco Ballet.
- Also nearby are the War Memorial Veterans Building and Davies Symphony Hall. East of Civic Center Plaza are the Asian Art Museum and the San Francisco Main Public Library on Larkin St.
- The SFJAZZ Center glistens on Franklin St. The African American Art & Culture Complex is just a few blocks west on Fulton St.
- Try the tasting menu of California-inspired cuisine at Rich Table. For Brazilian fare, step into Espetus Brazilian Steak House and experience the art of grilling as once practiced by 18th century gauchos. Head to Rambler inside of Hotel Zeppelin for pre-show craft cocktails and small bites.

EMBARCADERO/ FINANCIAL DISTRICT



WHAT TO SEE & DO

The Embarcadero — the city's east-facing waterfront, with its finger piers and glistening views of San Francisco Bay — is where San Francisco had its first growth spurt, thanks to the California Gold Rush of 1849.

- Eminently walkable, the Embarcadero is also the ideal vantage point to view "The Bay Lights," the world's largest LED light sculpture.
- The Exploratorium on Pier 15 is one of the city's favorite destinations for families.
- The beautifully renovated **Ferry Building Marketplace** is a foodie's paradise, stocked with wine bars, cafés, innovative restaurants, fine food shops and a farmers' market. True to its name, you also can catch ferries to the North and East Bay.
- The San Francisco Giants' bayside baseball stadium,
 Oracle Park, and adjacent jogging paths provide more ways to enjoy scenic views of the bay. Or get an engaging, free look at history at the Wells Fargo History Museum.
- Hungry? You're in luck. Try the iconic sourdough purveyor Boudin, award-winning eatery The Slanted Door or the Michelin-starred Michael Mina. Grab a sweet treat at Humphry Slocombe Ice Cream's location inside the Ferry Building.
- Area hotels include the Hyatt Regency, Hotel Vitale,
 Le Meridien, the Palace Hotel and Hilton San Francisco
 Financial District.

FILLMORE



WHAT TO SEE & DO

Fillmore St., linking the Western Addition in the south to Pacific Heights in the north, is the dynamic axis of what locals call "The Fillmore." A hub for San Francisco's music scene, the area has a rich musical history.

- On the south side of Geary Blvd., the legendary 1960s music emporium, **The Fillmore**, continues to rock with top-name performances.
- In early July, Fillmore St. between Jackson and Eddy streets transforms into a live music mecca, blending sounds of jazz and soul with art during the Fillmore Jazz Festival.
- The neighborhood is also home to some of San Francisco's most historic churches, including Bethel A.M.E. Church, First A.M.E. Zion Church, St. John Coltrane African Orthodox Church and Third Baptist Church (all of which are stops on the African American Freedom Trail).
- Upper Fillmore is one of the city's top destinations for shopping. Find chic vintage shops alongside big fashion names like **Rothy's** and **Alice + Olivia**.
- Go casual with some delicious California-style pizza at **Pizzeria Delfina** or splurge on a decadent dinner at the acclaimed **SPQR**. Then, finish your evening in the Fillmore with a nightcap at **The Snug**.





FISHERMAN'S WHARF



WHAT TO SEE & DO

The cheery ringing of the cable car bells; the sights, sounds and smells along busy Jefferson St.; the renovated historic red brick factories; the steaming street-side pots of Dungeness crab — all help make Fisherman's Wharf the city's top-rated tourist attraction year after year.

- Take a stroll along **PIER 39**. The repurposed wooden finger-pier is now festooned with restaurants, souvenir shops, street performers and attractions such as **Aquarium** of the Bay and The Flyer.
- Madame Tussauds and the San Francisco Dungeon are nearby. Be sure to check out their "Escape Alcatraz" thrill ride.
- The Blue & Gold Fleet runs sightseeing tours from PIER 39. The Red and White Fleet operates from Pier 43 ½. Tours of Alcatraz and Angel Island are popular draws, as are the historic ships anchored at the Hyde Street Pier. Water taxis are also available for on-demand, point-to-point service to locations around the Bay.
- Enjoy fresh seafood at a number of restaurants including Scoma's, The Franciscan Crab Restaurant and Fog Harbor Fish House. The one-time chocolate factory Ghirardelli Square is now a handsome shopping and dining complex where you can still get amazing sundaes.


GOLDEN GATE PARK/SUNSET



WHAT TO SEE & DO

Golden Gate Park, a 1,017-acre green rectangle on the city's west side, is a destination that merits a full day of exploration. The adjacent Sunset District features a long, wide beach with spectacular views of the Pacific Ocean.

- In the eastern end of the park is the **Koret Children's Quarter**, with its restored 1914 carousel.
- Farther west, two important museums flank the Music Concourse: the de Young Museum, in its compelling contemporary home, and the California Academy of Sciences, which includes a planetarium, aquarium, rainforest and more under one plant-covered roof.
- Green thumbs should head to the San Francisco
 Botanical Garden and the historic Conservatory of Flowers.
 Or, enjoy a cup of matcha and light snacks in the tranquil
 Japanese Tea Garden.
- The **National AIDS Memorial Grove** is dedicated to the millions of lives AIDS has affected. This beautiful, peaceful space is open for picnics and regularly hosts performing arts events and weddings.
- On the park's south side is the Sunset District, with its blocks of charming shops. Find local art including prints and California-themed tote bags at 3 Fish Studios.

HAIGHT-ASHBURY




WHAT TO SEE & DO

On the corner of Haight and Ashbury streets sits a beacon that calls to all who visit San Francisco: a street sign marking the heart of the neighborhood where 1960s flower power blossomed. These days, colorful Victorian houses brighten the hillsides and the streets are filled with restaurants and boutiques.

- Flamboyant clothing shops, piercing and tattoo parlors, and long-loved stores such as Love on Haight mix with hip restaurants and boutiques along Upper Haight.
- Downhill on Haight St., alternative bars, consignment stores and music shops with old vinyl records hold forth. Drop in at the **Haight Street Art Center**, a first-of-its-kind poster print shop and gallery that supports a collective of poster artists.
- The former Grateful Dead house at 710 Ashbury St. is a perennial attraction, as is the former Jefferson Airplane house at 2400 Fulton St. (Note: These are private residences.)
- Discover more of the neighborhood's colorful history on the Haight-Ashbury Flower Power Walking Tour, stroll along guided by Wild SF Walking Tours, or get an immersive experience aboard the Magic Bus.
- The iconic Victorian houses known as the Painted Ladies are nearby, too — a postcard-worthy photo opportunity.

JAPANTOWN




WHAT TO SEE & DO San Francisco's Japantown is

San Francisco's Japantown is the oldest of only three remaining Japantowns in the United States. Look for the bright red banners adorned with cherry blossoms and the Peace Pagoda on Geary Blvd. between Laguna and Fillmore streets.

- The Japan Center, a shopping complex on the north side of Geary Blvd., is anchored at both ends by the Hotel Kabuki and AMC Kabuki cinema. Drop by Pika Pika, a photo booth heaven, to snap a unique souvenir.
- The **Kabuki Springs & Spa** offers Japanese-style bathing followed by another relaxing import from Japan: Shiatsu massage.
- Cultural menu offerings range from sushi; ramen; manju, a rice confection still being hand-made by family-owned Benkyodo; matcha, a green tea beverage; and shabu-shabu, a meat-and-vegetable combo simmered in a tableside hot pot.
- A great place to visit any time, Japantown offers a number of festivals throughout the year, including the Northern California Cherry Blossom Festival; "Kodomo No Hi" or Children's Day in May; and the Nihonmachi Street Fair in August.

MARINA/ PACIFIC HEIGHTS




WHAT TO SEE & DO

Along the city's northern shore lies the Marina District, an area that's continually evolved throughout its history, from ocean dunes to exposition grounds to a fishing haven to a quaint residential neighborhood.

- Enjoy a sunny afternoon stroll down Union St. past many boutiques, spas and restaurants housed in beautifully restored Victorian buildings. **Marina Green**, ringed by bobbing boats and serenaded by foghorns, is picturesque.
- An Instagram favorite is the **Palace of Fine Arts**. Its arresting Greco-Roman style rotunda and majestic colonnades never fail to impress visitors and the site is favored by many wedding photographers.
- For some of the city's best views, climb the steps on Fillmore or Lyon streets to Pacific Heights, which rests atop a ridge to the south of the Marina.
- Fort Mason Center for Arts & Culture, a converted military base, is home to arts organizations and **Off the Grid**, a regular food truck gathering.
- Reserve a table at the Michelin-starred Atelier Crenn for a superb prix fixe menu that changes with the seasons. For Mediterranean fare, head to the local favorite Terzo. On Chestnut St., you'll find everything from artisanal ice cream to great pizza. Be sure to grab a slice at Delarosa.

MISSION DISTRICT



WHAT TO SEE & DO

The Mission District is one of San Francisco's most of-the-moment neighborhoods, packed with trend-setting boutiques, restaurants and more. But its namesake is one of the city's oldest icons, the 18th century Mission Dolores.

- **Mission St.** is the neighborhood's main drag and home to a variety of restaurants and shops. **Valencia St.** is ground zero for cafés, bars and clothing and accessory shops.
- Be sure to visit **Mission Dolores**, built in 1776. For recent history, check out the Mission's celebrated outdoor murals in places like **Balmy Alley** or on the façade of the **Women's Building. Dolores Park** is a popular green space that offers a perfect picnic location, people-watching and spectacular skuline views.
- No visit would be complete without a Mission-style burrito. Choose from local favorites like **La Taqueria**, **La Cumbre** and **El Farolito**.
- Burritos are just the beginning of Mission eats. Venga Empanadas is known for its stuffed pastries, Lolinda features delectable Argentine-style cuts from the grill and Central Kitchen offers standout locally sourced plates served family-style.
- For drinks, check out Curio to grab a cocktail before a show at The Chapel, or try Trick Dog, a can't-miss watering hole that's appeared on too many "best of" lists to count.






NOB HILL



WHAT TO SEE & DO

Those little cable cars that climb halfway to the stars in Tony Bennett's enduring song, "I Left My Heart in San Francisco," are climbing Nob Hill. Hundreds of feet above the city, this classic neighborhood offers famed hotels, buzzy restaurants, landmark architecture and stunning views.

- Learn the history of San Francisco's iconic vehicles at the San Francisco Cable Car Museum at Washington and Mason streets.
- French Gothic-style **Grace Cathedral** fronts the west side of **Huntington Park**, a refuge for parents and kids, dog walkers and lovers of green space, while the **Fairmont Hotel** rises to the east.
- To the north of Nob Hill lies **Russian Hill**, where you'll find icons like **Lombard St.**, a.k.a. "the World's Crookedest Street," along with pockets of restaurants and boutiques on charming, tree-lined streets.
- Top of the Mark at the InterContinental Mark Hopkins has long been a San Francisco favorite thanks to its panoramic, top-floor views. The Tonga Room in the Fairmont Hotel is a legendary tiki bar with an indoor rainstorm that completes the atmosphere. Other Nob Hill notables include Parallel 37, Aurea and the Big 4 Restaurant, to name a few.



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WHAT TO SEE & DO

It might come as a surprise that North Beach doesn't have an actual beach. It does, however, have a vibrant and strong Italian American community that for generations has seeded the neighborhood with fantastic restaurants and cafés. Old Italy, memories of Kerouac, and waterfront bohemianism meet of-the-moment eateries in this lively neighborhood.

- On the east side of **Washington Square**, vintage wooden houses climb Telegraph Hill, crowned by **Coit Tower**. Built in the 1930s, it's decorated inside with murals depicting scenes from California's history.
- Grant Ave. is rich with one-of-a-kind shops, while
 Broadway is lined with music clubs, restaurants and bars.
 The Beat Generation is showcased in City Lights bookstore on Columbus Ave.
- Look up to see "Language of the Birds" at Broadway and Columbus Ave. These illuminated books flying overhead are a permanent public art installation by Brian Goggin and Dorka Keehn.
- Get an award-winning pizza at Tony's Pizza Napoletana or tuck into Café Zoetrope for a wide selection of Italian and California wines. È Tutto Qua dishes up fresh, handmade pasta and decadent desserts. Original Joe's is a neighborhood staple that's been serving San Francisco for more than 100 years. To get a guided taste of the neighborhood, try Local Tastes of the City Tours.



RICHMOND/ PRESIDIO



WHAT TO SEE & DO

The Presidio, with its towering eucalyptus trees, is a 2.8-square-mile former military base reborn as part of the Golden Gate National Recreation Area. The Richmond District hosts a major art museum, a city park and San Francisco's de facto second Chinatown on Clement St.

- The refurbished red brick military buildings at the Presidio are now restaurants, hotels, and attractions, including **The Walt Disney Family Museum**.
- Of special note are **Andy Goldsworthy's art installations**: "Tree Fall," "Wood Line" and "Spire". A fourth, "Earth Wall", is inside the **Presidio Officers' Club**, which also houses exhibits tracing the Presidio's history.
- The Inn at the Presidio is a LEED®-certified hotel right in the park. The Presidio Visitor Center is the launching pad for park adventures, with its engaging exhibits and knowledgeable staff.
- The Outer Richmond showcases the **Legion of Honor** museum, plus **Lands End** and **Lincoln Park** for hiking, golf and glorious views.
- Places to eat in this area are plentiful. The Presidio features
 Arguello, The Commissary, Presidio Social Club and
 Sessions. The Richmond, with a variety of dim sum, Korean
 and Thai restaurants, is also home to some of the city's best
 places for wallet-friendly and delicious eats.








SOMA/YERBA BUENA



WHAT TO SEE & DO

The South of Market neighborhood (a.k.a. "SoMa") is stacked with major institutions on or close to Market and Mission streets.

- Here you'll find The Moscone Center, the city's premier convention venue, alongside the Yerba Buena Center for the Arts and Yerba Buena Gardens.
- Nearby are cutting-edge museums including the Museum of the African Diaspora, Contemporary Jewish Museum, California Historical Society Museum, Children's Creativity Museum and San Francisco Museum of Modern Art (SFMOMA).
- First-rate food is available at Michelin-starred Luce in the InterContinental Hotel; Barcha, which offers a modern twist on Mediterranean and Middle Eastern flavors; or Alexander's Steakhouse, where you'll find American fare with Japanese influences.
- It's always tea time at **Samovar Tea Lounge** overlooking Yerba Buena Gardens. For something more casual, head to the **TableTop Tap House** or **ThirstyBear Brewing Company**.
- SoMa is home to lots of luxe accommodations. The Four Seasons, W Hotels, St. Regis, Virgin Hotels and Hotel VIA all have properties in this neighborhood.





TREASURE ISLAND



WHAT TO SEE & DO

When it comes to reasons to visit Treasure Island, first and foremost, go for the view. San Francisco's entire northern waterfront from bridge to bridge is picture-perfect here. The island is also home to public art, flea markets and festivals throughout the year.

- Treasure Island is at the forefront of the urban winery phenomenon, with tasting rooms, tours and wine-themed events. Check out The Winery SF and Treasure Island Wines.
- The island hosts numerous major public events throughout the year, including the San Francisco International Dragon Boat Festival. On the last weekend of every month, the dogfriendly Treasure Island Flea is teeming with local vendors, artists and more.
- Mersea is a container-based (think of large shipping containers) restaurant and bar near the **Great Lawn** offering burgers, ceviche, fish and chips, soft-serve ice cream and more.



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

UNION SQUARE

WHAT TO SEE & DO

In a town full of great shopping, Union Square is the neighborhood with the most abundant retail therapy, not to mention fine hotels, great meals and green spaces to sit outside and enjoy San Francisco's temperate climate.

- Virtually every name brand in fashion is on or near the 2.6-acre square, a landmark park in the heart of the downtown shopping and hotel district. Macy's (also home to a Visitor Information Center), Neiman Marcus and Tiffany & Co. are just a few.
- The **Grand Hyatt** and **Taj Campton Place** hotels are just off the square on the Stockton St. side, along with a cluster of upscale boutiques. On the Powell St. side, the **Westin St. Francis Hotel** holds pride of place. South of Market St. at the foot of Powell St., the **Westfield San Francisco Centre** is home to **Bloomingdale's** and **Nordstrom**.
- Nearby are the Marines Memorial Theatre, the Curran and A.C.T.'s Geary Theater. Don't miss "Harry Potter and the Cursed Child at the Curran" through May 17, 2020.
- Sears Fine Foods on Powell St. is a local legend. Founded in 1938 and known for its world-famous Swedish pancakes, this old-school eatery by the cable car tracks on the west side of the square has given generations of diners a tasty start to their day.
- The Museum of Ice Cream provides fun and cheer with its ever-changing experiences and displays. Slide into a sprinkle pool, and, of course, taste some ice cream.

Whether your crew prefers playing in the great outdoors, learning about science or braving adrenaline-pumping rides, San Francisco has tons of activities to make your trip fun-filled and memorable. Here are 10 of our favorite family-friendly things to do.

THE WALT DISNEY FAMILY MUSEUM

Nestled in the historic
Presidio, The Walt Disney Family
Museum is a magical place for
kids—and for kids at heart. While
the younger crowd enjoys videos,
listening stations and other
interactive exhibits, parents will
appreciate the nostalgia of seeing
early drawings and animations of
their favorite Disney characters.

EXPLORATORIUM Kids' curiosity will be ignited as they check out more than 650 hands-on exhibits at the Exploratorium, at Pier 15 along the Embarcadero. Step inside a kid-friendly tornado to find out how the weather phenomenon works, play with sand that reveals invisible magnetic fields, and watch the dissection of a cow's eye to understand how our own eyes help us see. With zero no-touch signs and Explainers at every exhibit ready to answer questions, the Exploratorium unabashedly encourages discovery, creativity and, of course, exploration.

THE CALIFORNIA ACADEMY OF SCIENCES

Only in San Francisco can you explore an aquarium, planetarium, and rainforest all in one day – and all under one (living!) roof. The California Academy of Sciences inspires curiosity about the natural world with opportunities to study the intricacies of a coral reef, meet resident animals (including Claude the albino alligator), explore the depths of a rainforest and gaze at the galaxy.

GOLDEN GATE PARK
Parks and green spaces

are quite abundant in San Francisco, but the grandest of them all is Golden Gate Park, which easily warrants a full day of exploration. Stretching from Haight-Ashbury to the Pacific Ocean, the 1,000-acre park offers open space, museums and family-friendly attractions like The Koret Children's Quarter, which features a merrygo-round and playground. Bring a picnic and let the kids run off some energy in the grassy meadows, then check out a resident herd of bison cared for by the

to PIER 39 on Fisherman's Wharf. See the resident sea lions who mysteriously took over the PIER's docks after the 1989 earthquake and marvel at magicians, jugglers, comedians and more. The Flyer attraction will take your family on a bird's-eye tour of San Francisco's iconic landmarks. Other activities include Aquarium of the Bay, Players Sports Grill & Arcade, Museum of 3D Illusions, Maaowan's Infinite Mirror Maze, the San Francisco Carousel, a classic caricature stand and Frequent Flyers (think bungee cords plus a giant trampoline).



BAY CRUISE AND WATER TAXIS

Climb aboard a Bay Cruise to get up close and personal with the city skyline, the Bay Bridge and Alcatraz Island. Or take a ride on the Blue & Gold Fleet or Red and White Fleet for a smooth voyage under the iconic Golden Gate Bridge. However you choose to stretch your sea legs, make sure everyone in the family keeps their eyes peeled for sea life while on the water.

CREATIVITY MUSEUM Exercise the entire family's imagination at the Children's Creativity Museum in SoMa. Children can express their creativity through multi-media art and technology at workshops and

hands-on exhibits in various labs

THE CHILDREN'S

and studios throughout the museum. At the Wonder Workshop in the Tech Lab, kids can write code that programs a robot to navigate a maze and play music.

HISTORIC STREETCARS

Have an aspiring conductor or engineer on your hands? Take a ride on one of the city's historic streetcars. The cars run above ground on Market St. between the Castro and Fisherman's Wharf. Make sure you also visit the San Francisco Railway Museum, where your mini conductor can learn about the history of the fleet of streetcars.


THE BAY AREA **DISCOVERY MUSEUM**

Little ones can let their imaginations run wild at the Bay Area Discovery Museum in Sausalito. Located on 7.5 acres of National Park land at the foot of the Golden Gate Bridge, the facility includes seven indoor and outdoor spaces that offer thoughtfully designed exhibits and activities for children six months to 10 years old.



CHINATOWN

Soak up the bright colors and fascinating façades of the largest Chinatown outside of Asia, as well as the oldest Chinatown in North America. Explore the golden dragons and emerald roofs of Grant Ave. and Stockton St., then follow the scent of fresh fortune cookies to the famed Fortune Cookie Factory on Ross Alley to witness first-hand how the fortune actually makes it into the cookie. Start your day before 9 a.m. to take advantage of calmer streets and opt for a baby carrier instead of a stroller if possible.

San Francisco is home to one of the world's largest Pride celebrations each June, when the whole city explodes into a rainbow burst of music, dancing and excitement. To top it off, 2020 marks the 50th anniversary of San Francisco Pride, giving us all the more reason to party. Here are a just a few places where you can experience local LGBTQ culture, community and history year-round.

ASIA SF

Located at 201 Ninth St., this favorite spot combines restaurant, lounge and dance club elements to celebrate diversity. Since 1998, its world-famous transgender stars, the Ladies of Asia SF, have been the focal point, and their talent has made it a must-have San Francisco experience.

GLBT HISTORY MUSEUM AND ARCHIVES

Celebrating San Francisco's queer past, the GLBT History Museum (4127 18th St.) is the first full-scale, stand-alone museum of its kind in the U.S. Its archives contain an impressive collection of lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender historical materials.

GLIDE MEMORIAL CHURCH

Three decades after opening in the 1930s, Glide (330 Ellis St.) joined the national social justice movement among religious organizations. In 1964, they brought together religious leaders and homophile activists (precursors to the gay rights movement) to form the Council on Religion and the Homosexual (CRH)— the first organization in the U.S. to include "homosexual" in its title.

GOLDEN GATE PARK/AIDS MEMORIAL GROVE

The National AIDS Memorial Grove, or "The Grove," is located in the eastern part of Golden Gate Park in the San Francisco Botanical Garden. This is a dedicated space where millions of Americans affected directly or indirectly by AIDS can gather and heal.

HARVEY'S

Named after the late "Mayor of Castro Street," Harvey Milk, Harvey's Restaurant and Bar (500 Castro St.) offers drinks, food, comedy and more. The building was previously home to the Elephant Walk bar, which played an important role as an accepting and safe place for the gay community. It was reopened as Harvey's in 1996, dedicated to honoring Milk's legacy.

50TH ANNUAL SAN FRANCISCO PRIDE: GENERATIONS OF HOPE

June 27-28, 2020

San Francisco Pride is one of the oldest and largest LGBTQ celebrations in the world, and the massive annual parade down Market St. is the main highlight. Expect more than 200 parade contingents and floats representing a huge range of causes and beliefs. The parade kicks off Sunday, June 28, 2020 at 10:30 a.m. at Market and Beale streets and ends at Eighth St. near Civic Center.

NEW CONSERVATORY THEATRE CENTER

This not-for-profit theatre company (25 Van Ness Ave.) has been in operation for more than 30 years, producing theater experiences for youth, artists and the queer and allied communities. Offerings this year include the Tony Awardwinning musical "Fun Home."

BRANDS GALORE

In addition to quaint neighborhood retail districts and one-of-a-kind boutiques, San Francisco is also home to major brand-name stores and luxury shopping experiences.







UNION SQUARE

This historic park is the heart of San Francisco's downtown shopping and hotel district. Everything is within walking distance and set against the backdrop of some of San Francisco's most iconic landmarks, including the cable cars, Chinatown and Nob Hill.

Virtually every top fashion label in the world has set up shop in and around Union Square. Its extensive collection of luxury retailers includes the flagship Macy's store on O'Farrell St. (including an official Visitor Information Center), Neiman Marcus, Saks Fifth Avenue, Tiffany & Co. and Louis Vuitton.

Take a walk down the charming alleyways for more hidden treasures. Head south on Powell St. to reach Uniqlo and browse stylish, colorful essentials. For fancy classics, Brooks Brothers Group offers clothing, sportswear, accessories and shoes. Explore 50,000 books spread over three floors at locally owned Alexander Book Store.

WESTFIELD SAN FRANCISCO CENTRE

A two-block walk from Union Square, this massive indoor mall offers a mix of acclaimed brands and local treats. It's home to more than 200 shops and restaurants, including the second-largest Nordstrom in the U.S., the West Coast's flagship Bloomingdale's, Levi's, and the made-in-America-focused Makers Market. Finish the day with a spa treatment or movie on Level Five, or head back down to Level Four for the mall's signature happy hour under its breathtaking glass dome ceiling.

OUTLETS NEAR SAN FRANCISCO

Just a short drive from San Francisco are some of the West Coast's premier outlet malls, where you can find great discount prices on top brands.

NORTH

EAST

Traveling on a budget can be tricky, but luckily San Francisco has many free (or almost free) things to see and do that'll up the fun-factor without breaking the bank.

Here are 10 of our favorites.

CABLE CARS

Take a ride on the city's iconic cable cars, the

National Historic Landmark that moves, for just \$8. Then, stop by the one-of-a-kind San Francisco Cable Car Museum to learn about their inner workings—admission is free! In the historic Cable Car Barn & Powerhouse, the site where the cable system has operated since 1907, see the actual cable winding machinery as it reels 11 miles of steel at a heady pace.

AWESOME BLOSSOMS

With more than 9,000
plants from around the
world showcased across 55 acres,
natural beauty abounds at the
San Francisco Botanical Garden in
Golden Gate Park. Tickets are \$9
and admission is free on the second
Tuesday of the month. Or stop and

smell the roses (or the orchids, lilies and irises) at the Conservatory of Flowers in the northeast corner of the park. Admission is \$9 for adults and free on the first Tuesday of every month.

FREE FESTIVALS San Francisco's cultural calendar is packed with events - many of which are free. Music fans will love the People in Plazas mini concerts, where local performers share their talents, July-October. The Stern Grove Festival hosts concerts every Sunday from mid-June to mid-August and the Hardly Strictly Bluegrass Festival, a free weekend of bluegrass and Americana, happens every October. If you prefer theater, check out Free Shakespeare in the Park in early September at the Presidio.

MURALS GALORE
With more than 1.000

murals across the city, San Francisco's public art displays expand beyond museum walls. The Mission District is the epicenter; Balmy Alley and Clarion Alley have been canvases for public art since the 1970s. Coit Tower houses famed murals completed during the 1930s. The murals at the Rincon Annex Post Office were painted by artist Anton Refregier around the end of World War II, depicting a stylized history of San Francisco. Diego Rivera murals are located near the Embarcadero at Citu Club and near Fisherman's Wharf at San Francisco Art Institute. City Guides offers free tours of many mural locations throughout the year.

THE PRESIDIO

San Francisco's historic Presidio boasts 1.491 acres of land and some of the best vistas in the city. Adjacent to the Golden Gate Bridge, the former military outpost was repurposed as public land with many budget-friendly things to do. Check out the Presidio's Visitor Center to orient yourself and learn about its history, or get a more in-depth look at the Presidio Officer's Club (admission is free). The Presidio also has numerous scenic trails and perfect picnic spots, including Baker Beach and Crissy Field.

As one of the most photographed structures in the world, the Golden Gate Bridge also provides great views of the city as you cross. If you're driving across the bridge, there is a toll (electronic); however, crossing the iconic landmark is free to cyclists and pedestrians. In addition to your camera, bring a jacket because it can get chilly, even in the summer.

Get a behind-the-scenes look at how some notable local products are made. You'll likely score some free samples along the way, too. Explore the delicious history of sourdough bread in San Francisco with a museum and bakery tour at Boudin. Guided tours are \$5 per person or free to tour at your leisure. In Chinatown, see how fortune cookies are made at the Golden Gate Fortune Cookie Factory. The free tour ends with a sweet sample.

LOCAL TOURS

MARITIME NATIONAL HISTORICAL PARK

Dive into San Francisco's seafaring history on a trip to Fisherman's Wharf and the Maritime National Historical Park. The park's historic ships include 19th century vessels like the square-rigger Balchutha, and an early steamboat,



Eureka, among others. Self-guided tours of the ships cost \$10 for adults and are free for kids ages 15 and younger.

FUN AND ARCADE GAMES



OUTDOOR ACTIVITIES

The mild climate, easy access to the beach and several state parks make Napa and Sonoma ideal for outdoor lovers. A scenic drive will deliver you to the Russian River region of Sonoma County. Enjoy hiking on redwood-lined trails, camping, canoeing and rafting on the river's gentle waters. If you prefer two-wheel transport, flat roads and gorgeous scenery make biking a memorable excursion, and you'll find charming towns and plenty of wineries to visit along the way. Bike rentals are available in towns including St. Helena, Yountville, Healdsburg and Sebastopol. For an unforgettable experience, float in a hot air balloon over the lush wineries of Napa Valley.

SPAS

Built on natural hot springs, Fairmont Sonoma Mission Inn & Spa delivers the quintessential spa experience — dry sauna, private baths and two mineral soaking pools — while Forestville's Farmhouse Inn has made local produce harvested on-site the cornerstone of their spa treatments. Spa luxury meets wine country extravagance at Auberge du Soleil, where temperate springs overlook vineyards and the resort's own olive grove. Treatments include floral oils from the garden and a refreshing grapeseed scrub. Finally, Calistoga Spa Hot Springs is world-famous for its traditional volcanic ash mud baths.

FESTIVALS

With gorgeous surroundings and rich culture, Napa and Sonoma attract an exciting array of annual celebrations. Napa Valley's Culinary Crawl in February is a food and wine walking tour among downtown Napa's finest culinary destinations. In May, experience the first taste of summer at Napa's famed, three-day BottleRock music festival, which draws top musical acts from Mumford and Sons to Cypress Hill. If you prefer craft brews, Sonoma County is home to an Annual Beerfest each June called The Good One. Although the region might best be known for its grape varietals, you can celebrate local apple farming at the Gravenstein Apple Fair in August or the Sebastopol Apple Blossom Festival in April. The Napa Valley Film Festival includes film screenings and hosts celebrities from all over the world each November, and the Sonoma International Film Festival in March features more than 100 curated film selections.



SHOPPING

Shopping is a popular pastime in wine country. In St. Helena, one-ofa-kind shops line Highway 29. In Napa, the Napa Premium Outlets offer great savings on luxury brands such as Coach and Michael Kors. In Sonoma County, check out Santa Rosa's Fourth St. area, which is home to locally-owned shops, or drop by Railroad Square for a mix of antique shops and restaurants. In Healdsburg, SHED is a mustvisit for specialty ingredients and kitchenware. Oxbow Public Market in Napa is a marvelous source for artisan cheeses, breads, produce and local olive oil.

DINING

Napa and Sonoma are epicenters for fine dining and have a wealth of Michelin-starred and Bib Gourmand award-winning eateries. You'll need reservations well in advance to secure a table at the Restaurant at Meadowood or the legendary French Laundry, but the experiences are unforgettable. To sample local flavors in Sonoma County, head to The Girl and The Fig in downtown Sonoma, where uou'll find artful uses of cheeses. meats, fruits and veggies, all produced nearbu. Or, grab a table at La Salette for modern takes on Portuguese cuisine. If you love to cook, try a class at the Culinary Institute of America at Greystone for a day of delicious learning.

TOWERING TREES

Northern California's wine country is one of the few places on earth where you can experience the incredible feeling of standing in a redwood forest. These are the tallest trees in the world, growing as high as 350 feet and surviving upward of 2,000 years, making them some of Earth's oldest inhabitants. Many redwood forests were chopped down for lumber during the Gold Rush and relatively few groves remain. The Armstrong Redwoods State Natural Reserve in Sonoma County offers 805 acres of trails, campgrounds and much more. Visiting, hiking and picnicking in these magical forests is a singular experience for visitors. Save the Redwoods offers insider information, park maps and travel guides.

There's so much to see and do in San Francisco, you'd be forgiven for wanting some time in your trip to take a break. What better way to unwind than by visiting a restorative hot spring or spa? Northern California has plenty of them. Some are naturally untamed; others are part of luxurious resorts. Whatever your style, relaxation is waiting for you within a day's drive of the city.

CALISTOGA MOTOR LODGE AND SPA

Venture into wine country for some peace and fun at Calistoga Motor Lodge and Spa, which boasts fire pits, indoor whirlpools and hot mineral springs. To explore a bit more of the region, rent a bike and go for a ride through the beautiful landscape.

STEEP RAVINE HOT SPRINGS


Marin Tidal Hot Springs off Hwy. 1, Stinson Beach

From the thriving food scene to the diverse landscape, the East Bay offers countless reasons to extend your adventures beyond San Francisco's city limits. Expand your horizons with experiences across the Bay Bridge in Tri-Valley, Berkeley and Oakland.



TRI-VALLEY

Just 35 minutes east of
San Francisco and graced with
views of the surrounding golden
hills, Tri-Valley is full of events,
restaurants, wineries and shops.
You can see the region's three
valleys (hence the name) and four
cities (Pleasanton, Livermore, Dublin
and Danville) after a hike to the top
of towering **Mt. Diablo.**

With more than 55 wineries in close proximity, it's easy to make a day of tasting local wines and traversing the countryside. One must-visit is Livermore's **Wente Vineyards**, the oldest family-run winery in the United States. Beer lovers will want to raise a glass (or several) along the **Tri-Valley Beer Trail**, which includes more than 20 microbreweries where you can sample flights, learn about food pairings and chat with brewmasters.

Craving sweets instead? Allow the Tri-Valley Ice Cream Trail to guide you to 14 different local ice cream parlors around the region. Even better: when you collect five stamps on your Ice Cream Tasting Passport, Visit Tri-Valley will donate \$5 to the Valley Humane Society.



BERKELEY

Free speech and flower power are forever in Berkeley's DNA, but the city has evolved into a modern cultural hub. It's home to the parklike **UC Berkeley** campus, as well as renowned visual and performing arts centers, restaurants and outdoor recreation.

The Berkeley Art Museum and Pacific Film Archive (BAMPFA)

makes for a fun field trip. It's only one block from the BART station, after a 21-minute ride from San Francisco on the Richmond line. Opened in 2016, BAMPFA gives you a taste of the eccentric spirit that thrives in the Bay Area. At the heart of it all is the museum's collection of 19,000 works of art, dating from 3,000 B.C. to the present. The Pacific Film Archive is as vast as the art collection. Two on-site theaters screen more than 400 films a year.

Extend your trip into the evening on Friday and Saturday nights, when BAMPFA keeps the galleries open until 9 p.m. Afterward, stroll over to **Tupper & Reed** for a nightcap. The stylish bilevel bar and lounge is known for its delicious craft cocktails.



OAKLAND

Dynamic and diverse, Oakland is a destination in its own right. You'll find art, architecture, music, restaurants and bars to rival those of its sister city across the bay.

Head to Jack London Square to sample offerings from some of Oakland's top culinary talent. Grab expertly brewed java at Blue Bottle Coffee or pizza served around an outdoor fire pit at Forge. Don't miss plank, a one-of-a-kind entertainment venue and restaurant with bowling lanes, a beer garden and a patio overlooking the bay.

Work off some calories on a walk around **Lake Merritt**. Clocking in at 3.4 miles, the perimeter makes for a gorgeous stroll. Or take a walk on the wild side at the award-winning **Oakland Zoo**, home to more than 660 critters.

For an indoor excursion, spend a few hours at the **Oakland Museum of California.** OMCA brings together collections of art, history and science under one roof. Stop by Friday Nights at OMCA from 5 to 9 p.m. for a family-friendly night market, featuring Off the Grid food trucks, music and more.



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LOCAL DINING

Taste San Francisco's famous sourdough from Boudin Bakery or a scoop of ice cream at Three Twins. These are just a couple of the "only in San Francisco" treats you'll find in the airport. Four celebrated local chefs teamed up to open Manufactory Food Hall in the airport's International Terminal, offering food made from seasonal ingredients sourced from local farms, ranches and fisheries.





TRANSPORTATION

It's easy to travel between SFO and downtown San Francisco. The most economical method is BART, which costs \$9.65 from the airport to Powell St. and takes about 35 minutes. BART is easily accessed from any terminal by riding SFO's free AirTrain to the Garage G/BART Station stop. Taxis are readily available from the roadway center islands on the Arrivals/Baggage Claim Level of all terminals. The cost is approximately \$45-\$60 to the Union Square area, depending on traffic. To get to areas outside the city, there are shuttles, vans and privately operated buses departing from center island transportation zones on the Arrivals/Baggage Claim Level. Companies such as Luft and Uber also provide transportation.



GUIDE TO SFO

Fresh seafood while waiting for your flight? Check. An art museum? Yep. Yoga studios? You bet. A piano-playing pig? Of course! Here are a few great reasons why SFO deserves to be your favorite airport.

SFO offers ad-free, one-click Wi-Fi throughout the airport. Look for the #SFO_FREE_WIFI network, launch your browser and click "Accept the Terms" for four hours of free internet access. Need more time? Just log in again!

FRESH AIR

You've probably noticed in your travels that once you're in the airport, your next chance to be outside will be at your destination. Not so at SFO, where airport engineers have built an outdoor terrace with lounge chairs, landscaping and sculpture. This roomy space is a great way to stretch your legs and get your first (or last) look at the Bay Area's rolling hills and creeping fog. Located at the International Terminal.

WORLD-CLASS EXHIBITS

San Francisco's great museums are not limited to the city. SFO is the country's only airport with a museum program accredited by the American Association of Museums. Don't miss the Video Arts Room, where you can view works by contemporary artists and filmmakers, or the Aviation Museum & Library; both are located in the International Terminal. TRANSIT ROUTES

Curvy streets, hidden alleyways and lots of hills – that's what San Francisco is known for. But believe it or not, San Francisco is an easy place to get around, whether you're on a bus, streetcar or your own feet. If you opt for public transit, here are a few suggestions on how to get to some major points of interest from our flagship

VISITOR INFORMATION CENTER

Adult bus, streetcar and Muni Metro fares are \$3. Youth (5-17 years), seniors (65+ years), and individuals with disabilities pay \$1.50. Children under 4 years ride for free. One-way cable car tickets cost \$8 for anyone five and over. Muni Passports are available at the Visitor Information Center for one day (\$24), three days (\$36), and seven days (\$47), and are valid for unlimited rides on the Muni vehicles mentioned above.

ALAMO SQUARE Catch the 5 or 21 Muni bus at the corner of Market and Powell streets. Take the 5 westbound to the corner of McAllister and Fillmore streets, or the 21 westbound to the corner of Hayes and Steiner streets. Both buses also continue on to Golden Gate Park. Points of Interest: Painted Ladies.

CABLE CAR Walk north on Fourth St. Take a left on Market St., then a right on Powell St. Board any cable car at the Powell St. Cable Car Turnaround. Both the Powell-Hyde and the Powell-Mason lines take you to Fisherman's Wharf and Ghirardelli Square.

CASTRO Walk north on Fourth St. to Market St. and head into any of the BART/Muni underground stations. Be sure you enter the Muni side of the station. Take outbound Muni Metro K, L or M lines to the Castro Station. Or, take the historic F streetcar in the center of Market St. to Castro St.

CHINATOWN Walk five blocks northeast on Third St. to Grant Ave. Walk north on Grant Ave. to the Chinatown Gate at Bush St. Or, take Muni bus 30 or 45 at Third and Howard streets or the northbound cable car to Chinatown. Points of Interest: Chinese Cultural Center and Chinese Historical Society.

CIVIC CENTER/HAYES VALLEY Take Muni bus 5R, 7X or 31 westbound on Market St. or any outbound Muni Metro underground to Civic Center Station. Points of Interest: SFJAZZ Center, Asian Art Museum, and City Hall.

CLIFF HOUSE/SEAL ROCKS/LANDS END

Walk north on Third St. toward Market St. to the corner of Geary and Kearny streets to catch Muni bus 38 (destination - Lands End/48th Ave.). Or, take Muni bus 38R to the end of the line and walk down Point Lobos Ave.

COIT TOWER/TELEGRAPH HILL/NORTH BEACH Take

Muni bus 8, 8BX, 30 or 45 northwest from Third and Howard streets to Columbus Ave. and Green St., then head east on Green St. Take a left on Varennes St., and then a right on Filbert St. to Coit Tower.

EXPLORATORIUM Ride the eastbound historic F streetcar on Market St. to the Embarcadero and Green St. Station.

FERRY BUILDING/EMBARCADERO CENTER Ride the eastbound historic F streetcar on Market St. or take the 6, 9, 21 or 31 Muni bus to the Ferry Building. You can also ride any Muni Metro line inbound to Embarcadero Station.

FISHERMAN'S WHARF Ride the Powell-Hyde or Powell-Mason cable cars from Powell and Market streets, the eastbound historic F streetcar on Market St., or Muni bus 8X, 8BX, or 30 from Kearny and Market streets to North Point St. Points of Interest: PIER 39, Aquarium of the Bay, Alcatraz (from Pier 33).

FORT MASON Ride Muni bus 30 from Third and Howard streets to Chestnut and Laguna streets. Walk north on Laguna St. to reach Fort Mason.

GOLDEN GATE BRIDGE/FORT POINT Ride Muni bus 38 or 38R from Geary and Kearny streets to Park Presidio Blvd.; transfer to Muni bus 28. To cross the Golden Gate Bridge (weekends only), take Muni bus 76X (Marin Headlands Express) from Powell and Sutter streets.

GOLDEN GATE PARK Take a westbound 5 or 5R Muni bus from Market and Grant streets to Fulton and Arguello streets and walk into the park, or take the Muni Metro N line outbound to Irving St. and Ninth Ave. and walk into the park. Points of Interest: Japanese Tea Garden, San Francisco Botanical Garden, California Academy of Sciences, de Young Museum.

HAIGHT-ASHBURY Ride Muni bus 6 or 7 from Market and Stockton streets to Haight and Clayton streets.

JAPAN CENTER/JAPANTOWN Board Muni bus 38 or 38R at Geary and Kearny streets and ride to Geary and Laguna streets.

LEGION OF HONOR/LINCOLN PARK Ride Muni bus 38 or 38R on Geary St. to 33rd Ave. Walk north on 34th Ave. to park entrance (a short walk), or transfer to northbound Muni bus 18 on 33rd Ave. and ride to the end of the line.

LOMBARD STREET/RUSSIAN HILL Ride the Powell-Hyde cable car from Powell St. to Lombard St., or Muni bus 45 from Third and Howard streets to Union and Leavenworth streets. Walk north on Leavenworth St. to Lombard St.

MISSION DISTRICT/MISSION DOLORES Take Muni bus 12, 14, 14R or 27 westbound on Mission St. to 16th St. or beyond. From any Market St. BART station, travel southbound to 16th or 24th streets. To reach Mission Dolores, ride the outbound Muni Metro J line to Church and 16th streets, and walk one block east on 16th St.

NOB HILL/GRACE CATHEDRAL/THE MASONIC

Ride any cable car on Powell St. or California St., or Muni bus 27 from Fifth and Howard streets to Leavenworth and California streets.

ORACLE PARK Muni buses 10, 30, 47 and the Muni Metro N and T lines provide service to the ballpark. From Fisherman's Wharf, use the E streetcar.

PALACE OF FINE ARTS/MARINA GREEN Ride Muni bus 45 from Third and Howard streets to Lyon and Greenwich streets. Then walk north on Lyon St.

SAN FRANCISCO ZOO & GARDENS Ride the outbound Muni Metro L line to the last stop.


TWIN PEAKS Ride the outbound Muni Metro K, L or M line to Forest Hill Station. Across the street from the station, take Muni bus 36. Get off at Marview Way and Skyview Way. Walk up Marview Way to Farview Court. Turn right on unmarked footpath and walk to the overlook. Or, ride the outbound Muni Metro K, L or M line to Church Station and exit on the north side of Market St. and take the Muni 37 bus (destination Twin Peaks). Get off at 74 Crestline Dr. and cross the street to an unmarked footpath to the overlook.

UNION STREET Take Muni bus 45 from Third and Howard streets to Octavia St. and beyond.

YERBA BUENA/CENTER FOR THE ARTS

Walk down Howard St. to Third St. and make a left. The entrance to the Gardens and the Center for the Arts will be on the left-hand side of the street.







































